



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Compliance, surveillance, and enforcement

- Important aspect for fisheries management
- Ensure compliance to fisheries rules or regulations



Outcomes (What will it look like?) All coastal communities and relevant stakeholders have sufficient, regular and timely information to support resource management and build community resilience

Coastal communities empowered: i. to provide feedback and information to government, raise concerns, contribute to decision making, inform policy and ii.share experiences with other communities and stakeholders

Adequate number of priority communities are directly supported to sustainably manage marine resources to have noticeable impact on human wellbeing and health of fisheries

Local communities have the means of tools and capacity to monitor and enforce national or community management rules in collaboration with national or subnational authorities


Adequate coordination mechanisms support scaling up of CBFM

Effective mechanisms are in place for identification of external or non-fisheries threats and their resolution/mitigation All community members (men, women, youth and marginalised groups) are involved in transparent decision making and equitably access benefits

Compliance Strategy





- Most aspects of MCS work require an intervention...apply the VADE model
- V.A.D.E. what do we mean?
- International Model for labelling the compliance process (not just fisheries)
 - V = Voluntary
 - A = Assisted
 - **D** = **Directed**
 - E = Enforced
- Intervention method progressively changes
 - 'V' is 'somewhat forgiving' through to 'E' which is 'not so forgiving'
