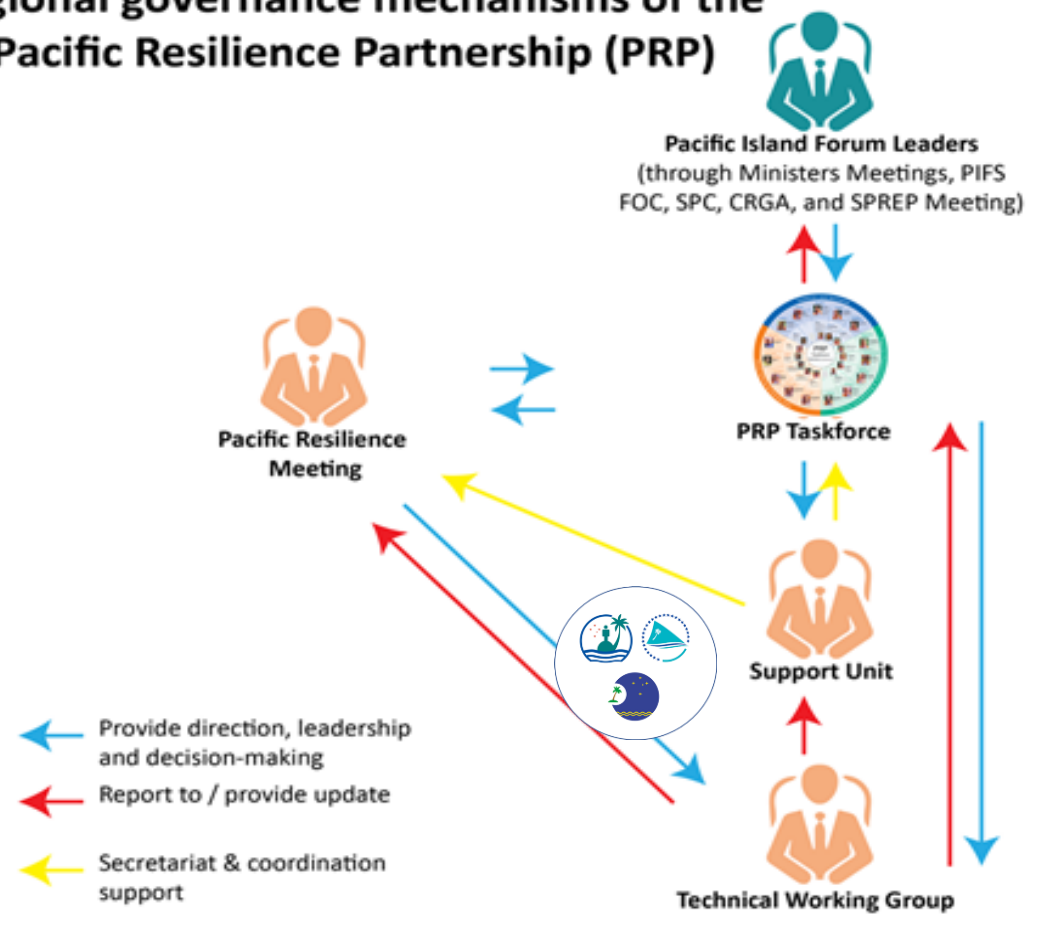
# Translating global frameworks to a Pacific context – from Global to Regional to National

# Outcomes of recent review of FRDP and PRP

## Achievements:

1. The FRDP goals and intent remains relevant.
2. Technical Working Group (TWG) are seen as useful.
3. Have the potential to mobilise resources.
4. Very inclusive.
5. Effective in strengthening coherence.
6. The flexibility and adaptability of the FRDP and PRP is seen as a strength.
7. Capacity development was a key enabler identified in the FRDP which remains important.

## Challenges

1. The initial momentum generated from the national level to combine Climate Change and Disaster Risk Management interventions appear to have regressed.
2. Overlapping global and regional commitments with duplication of donor and development partner coordination.
3. Lack of monitoring data.
4. The voluntary nature and variable value attributed to FRDP and PRP means that consistent engagement from the national level is a challenge.



# Entry points for Disaster Managers – supporting implementation of the 2050 through the FRDP

- The PRP Taskforce - strengthen the guidance and leadership role of the Taskforce through inputs. Samoa CEO of MNRE (Chair) and Kiribati and FSM NDMO offices are active members of the Taskforce. IFRC, PIANGO, UNDRR, ADB, EU, GIZ – partners you also work closely with.
- The Technical Working Groups – NDMO (Fiji and Solomon Islands) co-chaired the TWG on Risk Governance and Resilient Development – other TWG include DRF, Resilient Infrastructure and Resilient Housing, Gender, etc;
- The Support Unit – PIFS, SPC and SPREP;
- The biennial Pacific Resilience Meeting – outcomes fed into the DRR Ministerial in 2022 and APMCDRR
